Recognising this problem, the Major Projects Authority (MPA) was launched in 2011 with a strong and direct mandate from the Prime Minister to improve independent project oversight, ensure that civil servants have the right project leadership skills to successfully deliver and, importantly, provide the public with the confidence that money is being spent wisely.
