The Auditor General for Wales and the Wales Audit Office

The Auditor General for Wales is the statutory auditor of:

- Welsh Government and its sponsored bodies.
- Health service bodies in Wales.
- Local government bodies in Wales.

Legal basis for Auditor General's work:

- Duty to audit accounts (provide opinion on them).
- Powers to examine and report on economy, efficiency and effectiveness ("value for money" or "VfM") and to make recommendations for improving VfM.
- Statutory **discretion** in the way powers and duties are exercised.
- Is not directed by government can, for example, pursue issues raised by the public.

Wales is a country of small 'interdependent' towns



IWA '<u>Understanding Welsh Places</u>'

- What a town has and what it provides reflects the resident population's affluence and the towns geography.
- Towns are not standalone they are interdependent for work, services, shops and leisure.
- However, towns are not always interconnected for access and usage.
- Towns reflect change overtime but also the impact of national/local government policy.

Towns are interdependent and close to each other – Rhondda Cynon Taf



- Two principle towns in RCT: Pontypridd and Aberdare – Blue Circles. These are 12.6 miles apart.
- There are other communities with 2,000+ people **Purple Circles**.
- The furthest geographical distance between these is 23.5 miles Hirwaun to Pontyclun.
- No journey within RCT is over 1 hour.

Our research shows that businesses adapted, and adapted well



- 74% diversified their offer to provide an online service.
- 35% offered home delivery and take away services.
- 21% introduced mobile/pop up services.
- **12%** converted premises for alternative use or trade.
- 90% applied for and received Welsh Government money.

Support has been essential but not always effective

- 'Red tape', unnecessary bureaucracy and over regulation seen as major blocks by several businesses.
- COVID safety measures mixed success.
- 76% see the loss of Welsh Government support a major risk.
- But....most businesses (61%) and citizens (57%) expect to visit and use their town centre as they did before COVID19.

Welsh Government are investing in town centres



- Welsh Government has invested/levered in £900 million in regenerating town centres since 2014.
- Funding made available under **13** different streams.
- Funding is heavily focussed on physical regeneration.
- Plan for COVID recovery prioritises town centres.
